SERMON: JESUS: HERO OR ZERO?

Do you like the TV shows where ordinary folk, like you and me, can show off our skills to a panel of judges, who then vote either 'yay' or 'nay'? On TV shows like Masterchef Canada, America's Got Talent, and The Voice the judges either give you a golden ticket or send you home based on your performance. I like these shows.

I especially like it when someone who's rejected on those shows doesn't give up. They go on after the show to prove that the judges were wrong: like Mandisa, a singer. She was on 'The Voice' 16 years ago, and Simon criticised her harshly, as usual, because that's his schtick. Despite having a beautiful voice, Mandisa was rejected.

But, she didn't quit singing. In fact, she sang all the more. Since leaving 'The Voice', Mandisa has recorded 7 albums, 4 of which were nominated for Grammy Awards. In 2014, she won the Grammy for best Christian album. She's been nominated 4 times at the Dove Awards as the best female singer and has sold a million albums. On the show, one man gave her a 'zero', but to millions she's now a hero.

Jesus goes to his hometown synagogue, in Nazareth, one Saturday to preach and faces a panel of judges. It's interesting how God has only one son, and he became a preacher – not an accountant or a lawyer, but a preacher. I like that. People sometimes ask our son, John, if he's going to be a preacher like his dad, and he wisely answers them, 'I don't know'. It's not what I wanted to be, as a kid.

Anyways, Jesus preaches, and some in the congregation praise him. **'Many are amazed and ask, "Where does he get this wisdom and the power to do miracles?"** (Mt. 13:54) They're impressed with two things about Jesus: his wise preaching and his miraculous power.

How I wish I could have been there to hear Jesus preach. I wouldn't have had to go to seminary for years if I could have just sat at the Master's feet, for he is the best preacher to ever preach. Jesus made no mistakes when he preached. He put no one to sleep. His sermons were full of riveting truth.

Tens of thousands of people listened to him outdoors, sometimes for an entire day. Remember how they ran out of food and Jesus was afraid they'd faint on the way home, having not eaten all day? That's why he multiplied the bread and the fish for them (Jn. 6). Many people hung on his very words because Jesus **'spoke with authority'** (Mk. 1:22).

He didn't beat around the bush or go down endless bunny trails. He said **'Amen, amen. Here's the truth'**, or in KJV: **'Verily, verily. I say unto thee'**. This was strange because no one starts their speech with 'Amen, amen', Where is the word 'amen' supposed to go? At the end of a prayer. The word 'amen' means 'indeed, my prayer is true'. It's like adding an exclamation point, at the end, for emphasis.

Jesus could start his talks with an exclamation point because he knew that everything he says is 100% true. There's not one error in all Jesus says. With every other preacher we have to listen and discern which parts are true and which parts are exaggerated, or just opinion. We need to listen to every preacher, including me, with discernment.

But, not to Jesus. He spoke 100% truth 100% of the time. Think about that. How much do we speak the truth how much of the time? What percentage could we claim? Maybe, we speak 70% truth 70% of the time? Not Jesus. 100% truth 100% of the time. His authority impressed them. He was like no other rabbi.

The rabbis gave educated Bible talks in the Synagogue. They lectured like academics do today. They'd read a Bible passage and then talk about all its possible meanings. To sound smart, they'd quote what other famous rabbis said about the passage. For example, why did David pick up 5 smooth stones before fighting Goliath?

Rabbi 1 says that's because 5 is the maximum you can fit in 1 hand. David had a sling in 1 hand and 5 stones in his other hand. So, the lesson for us is to not be greedy and simply take what we need for each day, nothing more.

No, says rabbi 2. David chose 5 stones because the Bible starts with the 5 books of Moses (Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, Deuteronomy). David's power was not in the stones he chose, but in the word of God. The lesson for today is that we can defeat giant problems in life only when we have the Bible in us.

You're both wrong, says rabbi 3. The 5 stones are because Goliath had 4 other brothers (2 Sam 21). In case David had to fight them all, he chose 1 stone for each. So, we should be prepared for any challenge before us. Always plan ahead, including a back-up plan for when things go wrong.

Rabbis would go on and on like this, listing all the possible meanings of a passage. They'd quoted all the rabbis and then leave it up to you, the listener, to figure out the main point. It was like listening to a long, detailed, term paper from a Ph.D candidate.

Jesus was a breath of fresh air. He read the Bible passage, and then said, **'Amen. Amen. Here's the truth you need'**. People loved it because he spoke with authority.

They're also amazed at the miracles Jesus performed. Some of their own neighbours and relatives can walk because of Jesus. They can now see and are free from demons. Jesus did for them what no doctors could do. To some, Jesus is a hero because he helps people in need.

But, not everyone feels the same about Jesus. Some in the synagogue give him 2 thumbs down. **“They scoffed, 'He’s just the carpenter’s son, we know his mother Mary, and his brothers, and his sisters too. Where did he learn all these things?’ They were deeply offended and refused to believe in him”** (Mt. 13:55-57).

Here's a reminder to us that in every crowd there's always a Simon Cowell or two. We'll always have two, or a few, who don't like us. That's just a fact of life, and the sooner we realize it, the better off we'll be. At your work, and in your school, you've probably already found out that not everyone thinks you're perfect. These days, it doesn't take much to offend people. It seems like everyone is just 5 seconds away from blowing up over something. If you tell a simple joke now, you might get publicly slapped in the face.

Surely, not in church where everyone's on the same page. We're all on the same team, worshipping the same God. We'd never offend each other in church,, right? Have you been to church more than twice? My goodness, there've been more church fights and splits over silly stuff than I can count.

I remember my first church ruckus, which I caused. I was a young pastor at my first church in Hamilton. This was when we used overhead projectors to show things on the screen. If you're under 40 years old, you're asking, 'What's an overhead projector?' I wanted to show the Bible passage on the screen so we could read it together as part of my sermon. So, I put the projector on the communion table, which was in front of the pulpit. That way I was close to it, and it was the right distance from the screen so the congregation could see it.

As I did this, I could tell some people weren't happy, but I didn't know why. I saw a few frowns and furrowed foreheads. I figured they didn't like that part of my sermon. Anyways, I found out at the end of the service why some were offended by me. They told me I shouldn't have put that unholy machine on the holy communion table. They said it was a sacrilege. That was new to me.

If you come to church long enough, you will get offended by someone or something. Jesus, the perfect Son of God, was their guest preacher and some were offended by him.

Thankfully, this wouldn't happen in our own families, right? Our immediate family would never put us down, right? Some of you are shaking your heads. You know the truth, that even our own families can hurt us very deeply. '**Jesus' brothers and sisters didn't believe in him**' (Mk. 3:21). They called him crazy and tried to stop him from doing miracles. So, Jesus knows what you're feeling, if some in your own family have turned against you.

Wherever we go, and in whatever group we're part of, we will find naysayers: at work, at home, even in worship. Many in Nazareth call Jesus a hero, but some call him a zero. They say, '**He's just the carpenter's son**' (13:55). How many of you heard that Jesus was a carpenter? I heard that all my life. There are hymns that say it. Johnny cash sang, 'Jesus was a carpenter He worked with a saw and a hammer. And, His hands could join a table true enough to stand forever'.

Maybe, but the Bible doesn't say he was a carpenter. It says, Jesus is '**the carpenter's son**'. We know Joseph was a carpenter, and therefore, assume Jesus learned the trade from his dad. Jewish boys often followed in their dad's footsteps, but not always. The Bible clearly says that Jesus was a preacher and a healer. This is why some are amazed at him.

Some are mad at Jesus because he's '**a nobody from Nazareth**'. They say, 'We know him and his family. We've watched him grow up. He's no hero, and he's certainly not God.' Notice, they don't have any substantive criticism of Jesus. They don't criticize his preaching because they can't. It's biblical and true. They can't deny his miracles because the lame are walking and the blind can see. The proof is right in front of them. They have no solid reason to criticize Jesus, so they resort to insults.

They call him '**the carpenter's son**'. They imply that Jesus is a nobody because he's a Nazarene. Nazareth was a hick-town.

That's what Philip says, in John 2, when Nathaniel invites him to meet Jesus of Nazareth. Philip says, **'Nazareth? Can anything good come out of Nazareth?'** Jesus must be a zero if he's from Nazareth.

This leads Jesus to say that the toughest crowd we'll ever face is our own crowd, our home crowd. He says, **'A prophet is honoured everywhere except in his own hometown and among his own family'** (Mt. 13:56).

We know this as Canadians. We tend to not appreciate what we have here at home. When did multi-millionaire Kevin O'leary become a household name? After he left Canada to be on 'Shark Tank' in the USA. When did singers like Celine Dion and Brian Adams become famous? After they left Canada. Then, we'd finally admit that they're pretty good. Even the 'Great One' (#99) had to leave Brantford, as a kid, to play in Toronto. You know why -because people here booed him incessantly. None of you did that, I know.

Sadly, we can treat hometown heroes like zeros. It happened to Jesus. **'Some were deeply offended and refused to believe in him'** (13:57). This is how it's been ever since. Billions of people have said 'Jesus is my hero, my Lord and Saviour. I will follow him forever'. While billions of others have said, 'No he's not. Jesus means nothing to me. He's a zero'.

Jesus experienced this dual response wherever he went. As we'll see next Sunday, when we begin Holy Week, many yelled out their praise to him, **'Hosanna, blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord'**, while others yelled, **'Crucify him!'**

No person in all of history has been so divisive. He cuts every crowd in two and asks us, **'How about you? Are you for me or against me?'** All who cast their lot with Christ receive eternal life, for whoever has the Son, has life. Whoever doesn't believe in him, will die in their sins (Jn. 3:16).
